

Abstracts

Abstracts of the lectures and posters will be included in the delegate packs which will be available for delegates on arrival.

Poster Presentations

This meeting will include poster presentations for which abstracts are invited. All abstracts must be in English and must be submitted, as a Word document, **by e mail**, to Professor T M Reynolds at <u>info@pathologists.org.uk</u> by 1 March 2006. Authors will be notified by 1 April whether their abstract has been accepted.

- Abstracts must be submitted typed (font size not less than 10 pt)
- The presenting author's name must be underlined
- Please give details of the person to whom all correspondence should be addressed (postal and e mail address, together with a daytime telephone number)
- Bold or italic print should not be used in the text of the abstract, graphs or diagrams should not be included in the abstract
- No alterations can be made to the abstract after receipt
- The abstract should not exceed 250 words excluding title and authors (please include a word count)

Travel

By air

Transfer from Prague-Ruzyne Airport – Central Prague Taxi

Any taxi will drive you to the airport from the city centre. In the opposite direction, there are taxis marked "Airport" on their roofs. The price consists of a 25-crown boarding fee and the charge should be 17 crowns/km. You should not pay more than 500 crowns for the entire trip.

Bus

Prague's public transport system offers the cheapest way to get from the airport to the city centre. **Bus no. 119** operates between the underground station Dejvicka and terminal-North of Prague-Ruzyne Airport (Stop-Nove letisti). The 119 runs every 20 - 40 minutes between the hours of 4:00 and 24:00. This trip should take about 30-40 minutes including waiting-time. **Bus no. 100** will take you from "Zlicin" underground terminus to Ruzyne Airport (and back), in 13 minutes. The bus is adapted to carry additional baggage. On working days, in the morning and afternoon the bus operates at 15 minute intervals, at other times the interval is 30 minutes.

Before you get on a bus, you have to buy a 12-crown ticket, available from vending machines or newsagents.

Visas

Certain categories of British passport require a visa to visit the Czech Republic. If the national status shown is 'British Citizen', a visa is not required. However, where the status is anything else, for example, British Subject, British National (Overseas), British Dependent/Overseas Territories Citizen, British Protected Person or British Overseas Citizen, a visa will be required. To apply for visa, contact the Czech Embassy or Consulate in your country. Please note the visa application process can take up to 2 months.

Local travel

Public transport in Prague is excellent. There is an underground (3 lines), buses and trams. For more information and maps see <u>www.myczechrepublic.com</u>

Banks & Currency

Czech crowns are the official currency in the Czech Republic. Exchange facilities are available at Prague Airport and at most hotels, banks and exchange offices throughout the town. International credit cards (except American Express) are also accepted as payment in most hotels, restaurants and shops.

The exchange rate is approximately

£1.00 sterling = 40 Czech Republic Koruna as at October 2005
