The BJD 2006 World Network Conference and Patient Advocacy Seminar in South Africa

are taking place in a few weeks time from 1–4 November, 2006 at the Southern Sun Elangeni Congress Hotel in Durban, South Africa. Professor Girish Mody, NAN coordinator, South Africa, <u>modyg@ukzn.ac.za</u> is hosting this year's meeting, which is the very first BJD World Network Conference to be held in Africa.

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The official invitation and necessary registration information have been sent to each National Action Network (NAN) for two delegates to attend - the coordinator or another NAN representative and a patient representative. The theme of this year's Network Conference is: "Strategies for the Prevention of Bone and Joint Disorders". It is an important meeting where the BJD Global Standards of Care Documents on Osteoporosis/Hip Fractures and Pain initiated at the 2005 World Network Conference in Ottawa, Canada will be proposed for global acceptance by the conference attendees.

In addition, the new *BJD Strategic Plan* 2006 – 2010 and Beyond will be presented. The BJD International Steering Committee has held several working sessions to discuss key issues to the future of the BJD. We have now finalised a document which identifies the BJD's essential focus points for the coming years. We have asked all our BJD National Action Networks (NANs) for their input on the Strategic Plan and incorporated the comments in the document.

The Network Conference follows the Patient Advocacy Seminar (see below) and will begin with a Welcome Reception on the evening of Thursday, November 2, and continue through November 3 and 4, Friday and Saturday. Registration for the meeting will be open on November 2 from 14.00 – 17.00. There will also be a NAN-Mentor Individual Contact Forum during the afternoon November 2 with the possibility for the NANs to meet with a member of the BJD International Steering Committee to discuss individual issues related to the NAN.

The BJD 2006 PATIENT ADVOCACY SYMPOSIUM

Plans for our second Bone and Joint Decade International Patient Advocacy Seminar (www.bjdonline.org) in Durban South Africa have come together nicely and we're pleased to offer delegates a full training programme which begins on Wednesday 1 November and continues though Thursday 2 November, after which we will join the 2006 BJD World Network Conference, through Saturday 4 November.

The foundation for this year's Patient Advocacy Seminar will be practical advocacy skills training, with the objective of building an understanding of the patients' role in delivering messages, particularly messages about prevention, evidence-based medicine, minimum standards of care, and practitioners and patients working together. The targets for these messages are the government, the media and the public in order to influence public policy on bone and joint health, and musculoskeletal science.

HELMETS: A road safety manual for decision-makers and practitioners

A road safety manual for decision-makers and practitioners focusing on the issue of helmets has been published and launched in Bangkok, Thailand. The manual has been produced by WHO under the auspices of the UN Road Safety initiative, in collaboration with the Global Road Safety Partnership, the FIA Foundation for the Automobile and Society, and the World Bank, as one of a series of documents that aim to provide practical advice on implementing the recommendations of the World Report. WHO recognises importance of preventing arthritis and other musculoskeletal conditions across Europe and need for action.

WHO recognises the importance of musculoskeletal conditions across Europe which, along with the other noncommunicable diseases account for over three quarters of the burden of disease in Europe. The impact of arthritis and other musculoskeletal conditions on quality of life and the costs of health and social care were highlighted as well as the concerns about the increasing burden due to the ageing of the population and changes in risk factors such as obesity and lack of physical activity. The WHO European Strategy for Noncommunicable Diseases, which was adopted by all 53 member nations at the 56^{th} Session of the WHO Regional Committee for Europe in Copenhagen 11 September 2006, recommends an integrated action on the risk factors for these conditions, such as obesity, smoking, excess alcohol and lack of physical activity as well as strengthening health systems for improved prevention and control with a vision of a Europe free of preventable noncommunicable diseases, premature death and avoidable disability. The Bone and Joint Decade has provided the WHO with evidence of the burden of musculoskeletal conditions as well as strategies for their prevention and management. The Bone and Joint Decade is now working with the WHO Regional Office for Europe towards accomplishing the goal and objectives of the strategy, which will achieve better musculoskeletal health for people across Europe. EU Summit Conference on the Prevention and Therapy of Osteoporosis 10-11th June 2006, Vienna reported by Maggie Partridge – Osteoporosis was chosen as a priority issue for the Austrian Federal Ministry of Health and Women during the Austrian presidency of the European Union in the first half of 2006. The International Osteoporosis Foundation (IOF) EU Consultation Panel has been working to

name osteoporosis as major health care target for several years. The Austrian Society for Bone and Mineral Research (AuSMBR) and the Austrian Initiative for Bone Health have provided support to increase awareness of osteoporosis and its prevention on a European level as it is one of the most complex and cost-intensive chronic diseases in Europe. The number of osteoporotic fractures in Europe amounts to 3.8 million, 890,000 of which are hip fractures.

- 1. Develop and implement a wait list strategy to improve access to hip and knee surgery.
- 2. Develop and implement an osteoporosis strategy to enhance the level and consistency of osteoporosis care in Canada.
- 3. Develop and implement a musculoskeletal education strategy to enhance the training of health professionals
- 4. Train new clincial investigators with an interest in MSK research
- 5. Optimize patient involvement in the Bone and Joint Decade.

The COA 1st International Congress will take place at the Beijing JiuHua Resort and Convention Center. English and Chinese will be the formal languages during all the conference.

With support of internationally renowned specialists and colleagues, this conference will consist of paper presentations, subject lectures and updates of the orthopaedic specialty. The conference promises an intensive collective information exchange and academic seminar bringing together orthopaedic specialists from all around the world. Estonia. There has been a need for an organisation of osteoporosis patients for years. Obstacles in Estonia include poor knowledge of osteoporosis among the public, poor level of prevention of osteoporosis, osteoporosis treatment unavailable for patients because of expensiveness of drugs and lack of reimbursement, and poor level of information for osteoporosis patients about the disease. The president of the new Estonian Osteoporosis Patients` Association is Mrs. Maimo Teesalu. Estonian Osteoporosis Patients` Association in co-operation with Estonian Rheumatism Association organised informative meeting for osteoporosis patients in Tallinn in Estonian language on April, 4 and in Russian language on April, 6. Both meetings included lectures about osteoporosis, its risk factors, prevention and treatment. An additional special lecture was about physiotherapy and sports. Both meetings were well appreciated and had a good turn-out.

On April, 21 the Forum of Rheumatic Diseases was organised by Estonian Rheumatism Association and Estonian Society of Rheumatology. The goal of this forum was to inform publicity about the problems of patients with bone and joint diseases and to start discussion between politicians and patient organisations about these issues. FINLAND: To survey knowledge in musculoskeletal medicine, a questionnaire compiled by musculoskeletal experts was distributed nationwide in collaboration with the Finnish Doctors' Association to all doctors that had graduated in 2004-2005: altogether 950 doctors. If the results suggest serious deficiencies in knowledge, there will be negotiations with the Finnish universities about how to improve the educational pregraduate curriculum. In October pilot meetings will be held in two communities with all those working with children and youth about musculoskeletal ailments in children and overweight problems, in order to stimulate discussion and find new ways to enhance musculoskeletal health of children and youth. If successful, similar meetings will be held at other locations and material about how to enhance musculoskeletal health in youth will then be distributed.

A free of charge regularly appearing multicolour musculoskeletal magazine provided with the BJD logo is being distributed by the NAN. The magazine is widely distributed to health professionals, the general public and politicians. In every issue, patient-oriented viewpoints are highlighted. The first issue included an editorial entitled: "Musculoskeletal Health Concerns Everyone" by Finnish President Tarja Halonen, Patron for the BJD in Finland. During the Action Week in 2006 particular emphasis will be placed upon prevention and treatment of musculoskeletal disorders in occupational health units. The program is aiming to screen for osteoporosis all females over 50 with osteoporotic fractures. JAPAN: Mr. M. Kamata, one of the authors of a comic book published last year by the Japanese NAN, had an opportunity to meet with U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan and introduced to him some of the activities of the Japanese Network when Mr Annan visited University of Tokyo on May 18, 2006.

As reported in BJD Infoletter 42, the comic book was edited for school children so that it helped them to understand the musculoskeletal system and its importance for their lives. 150,000 copies have already been distributed to all the elementary schools across the country.

Mr. Annan, who officially announced his support of the world-wide activity of BJD in 1999 highly appreciates the efforts of the Japanese NAN and showed his interest in the facts that book had been translated into Korean and would be translated into some other languages. PAKISTAN: The NAN coordinator of Pakistan Mrs.M.H.Sherazee, S.I had a meeting with the BJD Pakistan executive committee to work out different

programmes of public awareness under the banner of Bone and Joint Decade in Pakistan. The committee will meet once a month to review the progress of various activities. The members of BJD Pakistan executive committee will initiate a campaign to involve new members from all over Pakistan.

A symposium on Orthopaedics for Family Physicians was organised by BJD Pakistan on 31st August, 2006 in PSRD Hospital. The objective of the programme was to sensitise the family physicians of musculoskeletal problems and the significance of early diagnosis and treatment.

Dr. Afzal Hussain is conducting a retrospective study on musculoskeletal trauma at PSRD hospital. The aim of the study is to create awareness among masses about the importance of early presentation of musculoskeletal trauma to a medical professional.

Under the Banner of Bone and Joint Decade Pakistan an activity was organised in Pearl Continental Hotel, at the meeting of Pakistan Women Club, Lahore to create awareness about recognition and prevention of osteoporosis in women. The meeting was designed for and attended by women from all different social standings – wealthy to poor – and was considered a success because it brought awareness to all of a disease which knows no social boundaries.
